14/24. VALE OF GLAMORGAN CBC – RAPID REHOUSING POLICY:

The Chair gave a brief overview of the meeting of the previous month with Carol Price and Mark Lawrence of the Vale of Glamorgan CBC Housing Department. All agreed the meeting had been most unsatisfactory. Furthermore, given the approach of the Vale Council to consultation about this important issue, members felt that going forward this matter was better dealt with in writing. It was agreed the Clerk would write to the VGCBC expressing Councils' views.

Nash Manor Junction: The give way sign at this junction has been badly damaged. It was agreed the Clerk would report this to the VGCBC.

Thank you for your letter of 19 April regarding road safety in the village of Llysworney.

I can assure you road safety is a matter I take very seriously.

This issue has been raised by several local authorities and whilst we have provided some funding to introduce new signage for the speed limit change and undertake necessary legal work, the replacement or upgrade of interactive signs was not seen as an eligible cost, as the speed limit had been reduced from 30mph to 20mph which could negate their need. Should there be a road safety case made for the signs in the future and where there is evidence of collisions, a funding bid by the highway authority as part of the Road Safety Grant would be considered.

We have no mechanism to provide direct funding to individual town or community councils as they are not a highway authority. I would therefore encourage them to work with the local authority when applying for funding to address any road safety issues.

We would expect the Vale Council as the local highway authority to work closely with GoSafe to ensure the correct signing is in place so they can enforce the speed limit. As residents have been monitoring speeds you may wish to ask GoSafe if they would help with setting up a community speed watch group in the village.

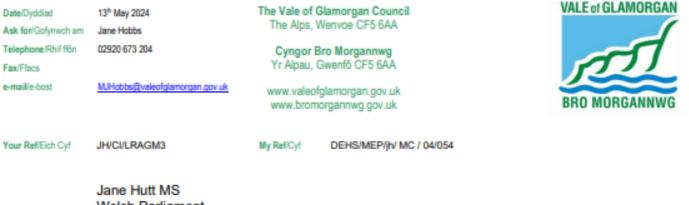
On 23 April, I provided my first <u>oral statement</u> to the Senedd setting out my priorities for transport, including 20mph speed limits.

The principal objective of our 20mph policy is to save lives and reduce casualties on our roads. I want to build from the consensus that 20mph is the right speed limit near schools, hospitals, nurseries, community centres, play areas and in built-up residential areas.

Re: Road Safety in Llysworney Village

I refer to your letter of 28th March 2024 regarding the site meeting at Llysworney Village on Friday 22nd March 2024, and I would concur that this was helpful and constructive engagement with the parties involved.

I can confirm that subsequent to this meeting the Council carried out traffic surveys within the village along the B4268 between at its junction with Church Street on the 18th to 24th April 2024, which revealed the two-way 85th percentile speed of vehicles travelling at 32mph. The Council uses the 85th percentile speed which is a measure of the speed at or below which 85% of the total traffic flow is travelling as an indicator of general compliance with the speed limit.

Whilst the results would be considered to show reasonable compliance for the previous 30mph default speed limit, they suggest poor compliance with the recently introduced 20mph default speed limit through the village since last September. As such only a small minority of motorists are travelling at excessive speeds through the village and when compared to a previous survey carried out between 17th to 23rd May 2022 at the same location which revealed a two-way 85th percentile speed of 35mph, the April 2024 survey shows a small but positive reduction. However, the most recent results clearly justify the need for enforcement through the village to achieve better compliance with the current posted speed limit.

The Council has now received a programme from its term contractor to implement outstanding road markings designed for all 20mph default speed limit gateways throughout the Vale, and this includes the provision of 20mph speed limit roundels as repeater signage along those roads which have been set at 20mph by Order. The road marking installations commenced on Tuesday 7th May 2024 and the contractor has been instructed to start installations at Llysworney as a priority. The Council will advise GoSafe when this work is completed along with some minor signage amendments to enable them to undertake their site selection process.

Correspondence is welcomed in Welsh or English / Croesewir Gohebiaeth yn y Gymraeg neu yn Saesneg.

With regard the suggested association with traffic speed through the village and the accident that took place at 16:32hrs on Easter Sunday, 31st March on the B4268 immediately south of the village, South Wales Police (SWP) have confirmed the incident involved a silver Ford car which reversing into a moped rider causing damage to the moped. Both parties exchanged insurance details at the scene without attendance of emergency services and SWP advise that there was no evidence to suggest inappropriate speed was a contributary factor with the incident.

As advised at the meeting, the provision of two LED Vehicle Activated Speed Signs is estimated to cost £14,945 based on Westcotec solar powered signs, as also advised, the Council has no old signs that are capable of being recycled for this purpose. The Council would welcome any reasonable partnership approach to funding of the two signs, including funding of the signs by the Community Council, and appreciates you exploring road safety funding with the Transport Secretary Ken Skates, however, there will be constraints to such an approach. The Council can support with advice and guidance but given the very challenging budget position due to recent inflationary pressures and rising costs generally, we will find it difficult to support with a financial contribution at this present time. However, we are always willing to look at alternative ways of funding with Welsh Government and, in this case, the Community Council.

As explained during our site meeting, the Council has not previously permitted private individuals or groups to fund their own highway safety measures due to the equality issues and impacts that this potentially raises between different communities. To permit such a position in Llysworney would undoubtedly set a difficult precedent and result in more affluent communities wishing to do similar, which could potentially create a two-tier system for highway safety initiatives. You will already be aware of a similar situation arising in East Aberthaw.

I hope that the above assists in addressing the points raised in your letter adequately and I look forward to receiving further details for a future meeting in mid to late June at Llandow village hall when the speed concerns can be further discussed.
